

Arranging a Funeral Checklist

This checklist will help before you contact a funeral director. It will also help you compare funeral directors and understand the costs for the choices you make.

- □ Obtained a Medical Certificate of Cause of Death.
- □ Registered the death.

Existing arrangements to pay for the funeral or any instructions?

Did the person who died leave any of these in place to help pay for the funeral?	 Pre-paid Funeral Plan (if they did – then this will likely already confirm the funeral director to be used and the choices made). Over 50 Plan/Life insurance policy Bank, Building society or other savings account
Did they leave either of these documents, which might include their funeral choices?	WillExpression of Wishes document

Key Initial Funeral Choices

These may be included in a will or 'expression of wishes'. If not, then these are the key choices you will need to make for the funeral and it will help to have a view before you contact a funeral director.

	Burial The average UK burial plot cost is £2,000+. Cost can vary widely from £1,000 to £10,000.
Which of the following funeral type is required?	Cremation The average UK cremation cost is around £900. Cost can vary from around £700 to £1,500.
	These are classed as '3 rd party costs' – mostly set by the local authority or private operators – the funeral director does not set or control these.
If burial, do you already have a burial plot or will you need one arranged?	Have one already Will need to arrange (funeral director can help)

Would the person who died have wanted a religious service led by a minister or a more humanist service led by a 'celebrant'?	 Religious Non-religious (celebrant) These are classed as '3rd party costs' - which will typically cost around £250 	
Did the person who died express a preference for the type of funeral they wanted? If not, what type do you think they would have preferred?	 Traditional funeral burial or cremation (around £4,000-5,000). Full-service funeral with many options. All transport included, with service at day/time to suit you. Simple "no fuss" funeral (around £3,000). Fewer options, basic coffin, some transport, less popular day/time. Natural/Woodland burial (around £3,500). More environmentally friendly burial at 1 of 300+ UK sites. Direct cremation (from £1,100). A cremation where no one attends. Ashes are returned. Intimate Cremation (from £2,300). A short early morning service, with a limited number of mourners (10-15). 	
Do you have a budget, the maximum amount you want to spend on the funeral?	£	
Search for Funeral Directors You can search online for funeral directors near you or you may already have in mind 2 or 3 well known local firms. Whoever you consider, ensure that they are members of either: The National Association of Funeral Directors (NAFD) The Society of Allied and Independent Funeral Directors (SAIF) The Good Funeral Guide (GFG)		
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Now you have the basic information to talk to a Funeral Director (s) about the type of funeral you want to arrange and the budget you have. This next section of the checklist covers questions you may need to answer and notes as to how you can keep costs down. This is most relevant if you are arranging a Traditional or Simple 'no fuss' funeral. As 'natural burial' and 'direct' are simpler and/or have less choices to make.

Please remember though you do have time, you don't have to decide it all immediately. You may find that you are quoted wide variations in cost for the same items. That is why it is important to shop around to find the right funeral director for you and at a cost level you can afford and are happy to pay. As a member of either NAFD, SAIF or GFG, the funeral director has to share a price list with you when asked.

Funeral Quote – checklist

The type of coffin I would like a quote for	 Basic coffin – to keep the cost down Understand full range of options and cost Environmentally friendly coffin Prices range from £200 to £1,000 or more.
I would like a hearse	 Yes No This is a chauffeur driven vehicle to transport the person who died, in their coffin, to the funeral. It is likely this will be needed, although it is possible to do this yourself. Typical cost is £150-£300.

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I would like limousines to transport family	 Yes (how many?) No These are chauffeur driven and follow behind the hearse. Typically cost £160 to £320 each. Many people save money by using their own family transport.
I want to be able to visit the person who died at the funeral director's premises	 Yes No This is usually possible after the person who died has been collected. The cost to view is typically between £175 to £250.
I would like the person who died to be embalmed	 Yes No This is a chemical process only recommended if the body is to be viewed. Typical cost £95-£200.
I would like funeral director to provide the pall bearers	 Funeral director pall bearers Can family or friends be pall bearers? Pall bearers carry the coffin from the hearse to the funeral service. Typically each bearer costs £30-£60 and there are usually 4 of them. Many people like to provide their own.
I would like a quote for family flowers	 Yes, what are the options for flowers No, I will sort A spray of flowers is a floral arrangement placed on the coffin. Funeral Directors can arrange these and may cost anything from £50 to £200.
I would like a funeral notice	 Yes No, I will sort Traditionally this is a paid for 'in memoria' local newspaper announcement, typical cost £50-£100. These can also be done online or through your own social media.
I would like 'Order of Service' sheets at the service	 Yes, how much? No, I will sort A notelet given out at a funeral that sets out order of the service and may include hymns/songs, readings/poems as well as

	details of the person who died. Cost from £20-£100. You can produce these yourself.	
For the type of funeral I want – how much are your funeral director 'professional fees'?	£ These fees cover staff, collection, care, transport, administration, arrangements on the day, paying 3rd parties. Fees can vary widely from around £1,000 to £3,000 and depending on the extent of the funeral.	
What is the total cost quoted included all professional fees, all options selected and any `3 rd party costs'?	 £Funeral director fees £Funeral director fees £Crematorium or burial fee £Total Funeral Cost It is important to understand all costs. The funeral director may give you 1 single quote for their standard range of funerals – so it is important to understand what is included in that fee. They should also make it very clear between their professional fees and the '3 rd party costs' which may also be called 'disbursements'.	
Additional Items: This section covers other aspects of the funeral you may need to think about.		
The pieces of music I would like played before, during or after the funeral		
The poems or readings I would like		
Will you have a photo or photos of the person who died to be displayed at the crematorium (maybe on a large screen)?		
Will anyone want to stand up and share some special memories about the person who died?		
Will you have a 'topper' for the coffin, such as a favorite shirt, golf clubs, hat or something special to the person who died?		

Would you like charity donations in memory of the person who died? Can people send flowers?		
Would you like a book of remembrance where people who attend write their name and a few words?		
What would you like to do with the ashes?	 Scattered at the crematorium? Returned to you to decide what to do with them at a later date? 	
Will you have a wake or reception afterwards? If so – have you thought about where this might take place? Will it be at home, maybe a local hall, hotel or pub. Can friends and family help?		
In respect of the day of the funeral, draw up your invite list and ensure the details are shared of when and where it will be held, including any reception. What would you like them to wear (sombre or colourful clothing maybe), confirm if they can send flowers or make a donation, and if they can bring food or drink to the reception?		
If anyone cannot be there in person, would you like to webcast the funeral (so it can be viewed online) or record it?
